Syllabus:	<p>The aim of the optional course "International Humanitarian Law" is to give interested parties a comprehensive interpretation of the international law of armed conflict at present. The content of the subject will focus on the development, entities and sources of international humanitarian law and its implementation and punishment of serious violations (war crimes) at national and international level.</p> <p>During the course the following main topics will be presented:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"><li>1. The concept of international humanitarian law (IHL). Historical development, sources of IHL and its position in contemporary international law. Bodies IHL.</li><li>2. Jus ad bellum and jus in bello. The importance of the UN Charter and the prohibition of the use of force.</li><li>3. The concept of armed conflict and its types. Distinguishing between international and domestic armed conflicts.</li><li>4. Prohibiting the use of certain weapons and disarmament.</li><li>5. Hague law. The rules regulating the means and methods of warfare.</li></ol>
